This newsletter was inspired by Dr. Eric Bryant, one of my mentors in life. He spoke about the Basilica Sagrada Familia in Barcelona, designed by Gaudi. Sagrada's construction began in 1882 and it's still being built. Our guess is that this cathedral will be around a millennium from now.

"Cathedral thinking" is a powerful metaphor for living a life of true significance and building a legacy that endures beyond your lifetime, just like Gaudi. The concept originates from the medieval era, when cathedral builders often began construction on structures they knew they would never live to see completed. Despite this, they pursued

the work with dedication, artistry, and a sense of purpose because they understood they were contributing to something far greater than themselves.

Here's how this idea connects to living a meaningful life and leaving a lasting legacy:

1. Thinking Beyond Your Lifetime

Cathedral thinking requires long-term vision. The stonemasons and architects who built cathedrals worked for decades or centuries, with multiple generations contributing to the same goal.

• **Life of Significance Application:** When we live with cathedral thinking, we invest in people, values, and causes that will ripple far beyond our own lives. Instead of chasing only immediate rewards, we focus on impact that benefits future generations—whether that's through mentoring, creating institutions, advancing knowledge, or nurturing a family legacy.
